Date of Risk Assessment: updated Sept 2021 (V8)

Description of activity being risk assessed: PLC operation from Sept 2021 in response to Coronavirus.

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This risk assessment has been developed to clarify Pathways Learning Centre (PLC) strategy and protocol for the implementation of the requirements of government guidance for schools from September 2021. It is a dynamic risk assessment and will continue to be reviewed in response to any updated government or local authority guidance.

We have taken on board the wide range of guidance available to schools, when considering the risk mitigation measures required at PLC. As the range of guidance documents has increased, we have compiled a table of all the key references at the end of this document. An overview of these key documents can be found in Appendix C - Table of key reference documents with the key guidance for specialist settings available here:

August 2021 contingency framework

It is also important to highlight that the 'contingency framework' for education settings, launched in January 2021 (Updated August 2021), clearly states that where the contingency framework is implemented, alternative provision (including pupil referral units, AP academies, AP free schools) should continue to allow all children or pupils to attend full-time. Tiers of restriction

This risk assessment also reflects government guidance regarding the 'Tiers of national restriction for education...' and recognises that as an Alternative Provision (AP) / specialist setting, PLC will remain open at all times, unless specifically guided otherwise by the government or local authority. Lateral flow testing

The introduction of the requirement to implement lateral flow testing (LFT) in all schools from January 2021 presents some significant challenges. The details of our risk reduction protocols, implementation, quality assurance and monitoring procedures can be found in **Appendix C**. <u>Lateral Flow Testing (LFT) risk assessment and working protocols</u>. This risk assessment continues to apply for on-site LFT testing protocols from September 2021.

Additional guidance for rapid asymptomatic testing in specialist settings and APs has also been provided.

September 2021

We will test all students (Yr 7+) on their return to school in September 2021. Only CYP who have given informed consent will be tested. <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/guidance-for-full-opening-special-schools-and-other-specialist-settings/rapid-asymptomatic-testing-in-specialist-settings-applies-from-step-4#consent

PLC staff have been training to carry out the varying functions of the LFT process, as it is best for our CYP to be supported by staff they know. This will continue in September 2021 and we will continue to offer on-site LFD testing for those unable to carry out testing at home.

Positive LFT test results

Staff and students with positive LFDs should continue to self-isolate in line with 'stay at home guidance'. They will also need to get a PCR test to check if they have Covid 19

Contact tracing - Until Step 4, we will continue to carry out contact tracing. Where a case is identified, the designated staff member will initiate contact tracing procedures and continue to access support through the dedicated advice service introduced by Public Health England (PHE), which can be reached via the DfE helpline on 0800 046 8687, or the relevant PHE local health protection team if escalated. From Step 4, close contacts will be identified via NHS Test and Trace and settings and we are no longer required to identify close contacts of individual cases. However, we will continue to have a role in working with health protection teams in the case of a local outbreak.

Face coverings

There is general reference throughout this risk assessment related to the wearing of face coverings. We will continue to monitor available guidance regarding this matter, but for now, we are following the latest government guidance below which currently states that face coverings do not need to be worn.

However, we also appreciate that some staff and students may wish to continue to wear masks, for a variety of reasons, and we will continue to support them in their choice to do so.

Safeguarding 2021/2022

We continue to follow our rigorous safeguarding practice, policy and available guidance. All PLC pupils are risk assessed against a number of criteria to support any decisions to 'close schools', recognising that as an AP we will remain open to as many vulnerable pupils as possible, closely support and monitor the welfare of those pupils off site and ensure all students have access to our 'blended learning offer'. (See PLC student risk assessments for further details)

September 2021 – it is now even less likely that PLC CYP will not be in attendance at school. As an AP, we were previously only closed to CYP if they had received positive PCR, OR, were a close contact of a confirmed case. As of September 2021 isolation as a result of being a direct contact is no longer required for CYP under 18 year 6 months. However, we will continue to follow a graduated response based on local/national guidance. (See Contingency Plan Appendix D)

Prevention and response - Mitigating risks in schools:

We are continuing to use the broad guidance on 'prevention and response' first outlined in the November 2020 guidance as well as more recent guidance outlined above and listed in <u>Appendix C – Table of key reference documents</u>. By following the guidance in school settings can be "confident that they are managing risk effectively".

Risk mitigation – It is impossible to mitigate any risk entirely but the following risk reduction measures MUST be followed:

Systems of controls - Prevention and Response to infection

Prevention

1) Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school.

- 2) Where recommended, use of face coverings in schools.
- 3) Clean hands thoroughly more often than usual.
- 4) Ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.
- 5) Introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents and bleach.
- 6) Minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible.
- 7) Where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE).

Numbers 1 to 5 must be in place in all schools, all the time.

Number 6 must be properly considered and schools must put in place measures that suit their particular circumstances.

Number 7 applies in specific circumstances.

Response to any infection

- 8) Engage with the NHS Test and Trace process.
- 9) Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community.
- 10) Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice.

Numbers 8 to 10 must be followed in every case where they are relevant.

Main risk assessment

The measures identified to mitigate against the systems of control outlined above are highlighted in the columns labelled 'prevention' and 'response' in the table below:

Face coverings for those who need them as part of PPE protocols are available throughout the school.

Face coverings - Nov 2020 update

In early years settings, there is no change to the existing position. It is not mandatory for staff and visitors to wear face coverings. In situations where social distancing between adults in settings is not possible (for example when moving around in corridors and communal areas), settings have the discretion to recommend the use of face coverings for adults on site, for both staff and visitors.

Jan 2021 – In light of the latest guidance and national lockdown, we will increase the wearing of face masks.(see updated link above)

March 2021 – additional guidance regarding the use of face covering in classroom settings to be followed by all on their return.

<u>September 2021 – Risk reduction measure currently</u> <u>not required. See contingency plan.</u>

However, PLC supports the decision of any student or member of staff who may choose to continue to wear a mask. We will provide information to staff and pupils on the safe wearing and removal of face coverings.

From Nov 2020 we will request all staff to wear masks around all communal and busy areas of the school and will encourage students to do the same. Students will not be required to wear masks in their classroom, unless the classroom is particularly small and has reduced risk reduction measures in place. Eg. It is not possible to ventilate the room.

Jan 2021 and March 2021— All staff on site are expected to wear face masks at all times in communal areas and to increase the wearing of face masks during lessons, particularly where 2+M cannot be maintained, where classroom ventilation is poor, or in the same space for more than 15mins.

Students are also expected to wear masks in communal areas and where lessons permit. eg. We recognise the games and PE lessons will not be able to wear masks at all times, but careful attention should be paid to good ventilation and activities that allow social distancing as much as possible.

We will continue to work with parents of any students refusing to wear masks. This may result in a student being risk assessed as unsafe to be on site. This risk has now been significantly reduced as a result of the staff vaccination roll out.

Appendix D – PLC Covid 19 contingency and outbreak management plan

From September 2021

PLC will continue to remain open to all CYP at all Tiers of restriction and follow the operational guidance to ensure contingency arrangements are in place to safely manage an outbreak of Covid 19 in future. As an AP, PLC may need to refer back to previous risk reduction measures, should restrictions to student attendance be necessary.

PLC will follow the four key principles outlined in the government operational guidance and below:

https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/actions-for-schools-during-the-coronavirus-outbreak/schools-covid-19-operational-guidance

- maximise the number of children in face-to-face education or childcare and minimise any disruption in a way that best manages the COVID-19 risk
- managing transmission should be weighed against any educational drawbacks
- measures should affect the minimum number of children for the shortest time
- attendance restrictions should be considered as a last resort where all other risk mitigations have not broken chains of in-school transmission

Day to day operations

PLC will continue to implement the base line measures outlined in the detailed risk assessment above. This included:

- continued enhance daily cleaning
- promotion of hand and respiratory hygiene
- ventilation requirements

Safeguarding measures:

- PLC will ensure there is a trained DSL or deputy DSL on site wherever possible.
- If the DSL (or deputy) can't be on site, they can be contacted remotely. (all other staff know this contact number/s)
- The PLC Safeguarding and child protection remains effective during all potential Covid 19 steps. Additional safeguarding protocols in place, for example, during any future 'lock down' will remain in place.

PLC will follow the recommended control measures at four identified levels as follows:

- 1. Baseline control measures (green) at all times
- 2. Additional outbreak control measures Trigger when the threshold for specialist settings is met.
- 3. Enhanced outbreak control measures some, or all of these measures may be recommended following a risk assessment (IMT) with local authority public health or the SWHPT.
- 4. Exceptional outbreak control measures these measures may be recommended in exceptional circumstances following a joint risk assessment (education and public health) via an Outbreak Control Team (OCT) meeting

The threshold for specialist settings is described as:

2 cases who are likely to have mixed closely** test positive within a 10-day period (SEND/residential schools or settings with <20)

AND/OR Following any hospitalisation

We will report any outbreak for risk assessment if we meet the thresholds (s), via the South Glos local process or via DfE helpline (0800 046 8687). (See reporting process below)

Attendance restrictions for any reason:

Attendance restrictions will only be instigated in exceptional circumstances and when all other risk reduction measures have been considered and in consultation with local Health Protection teams.

Remote Learning:

High-quality remote learning will be provided for all pupils and students if:

- they have tested positive for COVID-19 but are well enough to learn from home; or
- attendance at their setting has been temporarily restricted
